OFFICIAL OPENING OF THE CONVENTION

The Annual Convention of the New York State/Eastern Ontario Fraternal Order of Eagles was officially opened at 1:00 P.M. on June 17, 1993 in the home of Utica Aerie #97.

Master of Ceremonies for the opening was John Fresina, Worthy President of Utica #97. Lew Smith and Donald Rettinger led the delegation in singing of the National Anthem of Canada and the United States. The Invocation was given by Lew Smith, Chaplain of Utica #97.

The delegates were then officially welcomed by Aerie President John Fresina. He then introduced the Mayor of Utica, Lewis Lapola, who welcomed all to the Utica area. 1993 STATE CONVENTION

RULES OF THE CONVENTION

Credentials for admission: Properly accredited delegates and Past Worthy Presidents, along with Ten Year Secretaries, shall obtain their credentials from the proper committee upon presentation of official receipts showing that they are in good standing in the Aerie.

No person shall be admitted to the main floor unless he is a delegate, Past Worthy President, or Ten Year Secretary. He must display his credentials and deposit the daily attendance slip with the proper Aerie Officers. A visiting member in good standing, not a delegate, may attend the Convention sessions, in a section set aside by the Committee, as a spectator only.

A delegate desiring to be heard on any subject, which is properly before the Aerie, shall rise, give the salutation sign, address the Worthy President, and state his name and number of his Aerie. When recognized by the President, he may proceed.

A question indefinitely postponed shall not again be considered, except by the action of two-thirds of the delegates voting again to take up the matter.

The election shall convene in the Aerie Home where the Credentials Committee is meeting on Saturday, June 19, 1993, from 8:00 A.M. to 10:00 A.M. Only official ballots to be received. The count shall begin promptly at the close of the polls and continue to the completion thereof.

Delegates must present their credentials and ballots depositing the latter in the ballot box, first ascertaining the number of votes indicated on the credential is identical with that indicated on the ballot and that no erasures appear thereon.

Any part of the issue not covered by the Rules of the Convention or the Rules or Order shall be governed by Robert's Rules or Order Revised.

At this time, it is customary to read the Order of business for the Convention, but in view of the fact there is not great change in the procedure as regards to previous sessions and also that copies of the Order of Business have been distributed to all of the delegates, I shall dispense with the reading of the same, if there are no objections. However, they will be included in the Convention Proceedings.

REPORT OF THE MEMORIAL FOUNDATION

The Eagles Memorial Foundation is a memorial to the Eagle men and women in the armed services, law enforcement, and fire protection who gave their lives in the line of duty. The Memorial Foundation went into active operation in July, 1947 with more than \$3,000,000 in voluntary contributions. Money in the fund is invested. Returns on the investments and the continued contributions from Eagles Auxiliaries and Aeries carry out the Foundation's aims: financial assistance in education, medical, surgical, hospital, dental, and optical requirements of eligible children. These children continue to be eligible for benefits until they reach the age of 18 unless married or self-supporting before then.

Educational assistance is available to age 25, unless married and self-supporting before then. Remarriage of the mother or father does not change the eligibility of the child.

Under the name "Golden Eagle Fund," Memorial Foundation benefits have been extended to provide assistance to charitable, scientific, or educational institutions, organizations or groups who care for or otherwise help older people or conduct research in geriatrics or treat older people for or advise them concerning the problem of aging. It will also provide recreation, education, guidance, or services for them by means of printed material and by other means, and to promote their participation in community projects.

Under Special Order of Business, Bruce T. Samboy and Daryl K. Messner, representatives of the NYS Race & Wagering Board, were introduced. They advised that they were here to answer any questions and to help. Mr. Samboy advised that the money raised goes to charity. Bingo is the most successful fundraiser, however, over the past few years the profits have been dwindling. State Law notes \$1,000 for each occasion. There can be 3 bingo occasions per day per license. He noted that three single occasions have to be licensed. He noted that this is legal because it is three separate occasions. He stated that the per capita is going up on games and that bingo should not die.

Messrs. Samboy and Messner advised getting Bell Jar tickets into the bingo games. Capital spending will raise from the sale of these tickets and you profit. TV monitors can be built into it and with written permission you can have one person at the receptacle. There is a computer which can be used at bingo which will read the serial number and face number. The computer puts the winning card numbers on the screen. It is then in the computer and can be examined with modern technology to make it easier. Double and triple headers can be run a couple times a month instead of every week and you can still raise enough money.

With regard to Games of Chance, your I.D. # lets you have casino night. You can be licensed to set up gambling tables for \$25.00 per day. Your Bell Jar I.D. # can let you do this. You can make a lot of money this way.

There are no State inspections on the road any more. You can go to the Albany office for training sessions.

The law requires that 100% of the money raised has to go to charity. By law, there are State trust funds. The money belongs to the State. All the money is controlled in the State trust funds. At least one-third is donated for charity. You can pay the janitor, however, you cannot pay the bartender. The bar can be opened during bingo, but not in the same room. Bell Jar tickets can be sold during bingo and Officers of the Club are not the only ones who can sell the tickets. If a person who has been selling the tickets goes off duty, he/she cannot buy any of the tickets the same day. Bingo workers cannot buy the tickets on the night they are working. Members in charge of the tickets are responsible for the tickets. It is also against the law to have coin operated gambling machines in Clubs. They also noted that you can keep two-thirds of the Bell Jar money.

With regard to illegal gambling, the person in charge of the Bell Jar tickets can be arrested. If a Trustee had knowledge of same, he can also be arrested. Anyone involved with the operation can be arrested. If a box of tickets is sold and the money is used for another means, this is illegal. You pay out 75% of a box of tickets and then hold the remainder of the tickets for 6 months.

It was noted that there are serial numbers on all of the tickets. These numbers are also on the invoice. You can also check the colors. The only way you can tell an illegal ticket is by the form number, the serial number and the color. They advised that they can be contacted at any time if someone has questions or concerns.

Brother Yager thanked Mr. Samboy and Mr. Messner for taking the time to come to this Convention and for all of their help and advice. They were then excused from the meeting.

FIRST REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

1st Resolution:

This Order of the Grand Tribunal was rendered in Columbus, Ohio, Saturday, June 5, 1993 and became effective immediately. Signed by William M. Hatten, Chief Justice.

In the matter of the expulsion of: Barbara Cyphers, Bonnie Quatkemeyer, Dolores Hoffman, Kathy Gonzagowski, Dolores Colclough, Marge Frey, Eugene Rott, Richard Stubbs, Dale Thomas:

GRAND TRIBUNAL ORDER

Pursuant to Article V of the Constitution of the Fraternal Order of Eagles and the inherent power vested in the Grand Tribunal, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED AS FOLLOWS:

- (1) That the accused are hereby immediately ordered to cease and desist from supporting, participating in or condoning future coalition activities, or be expelled;
- (2) The Board of Grand Trustees shall prepare for and support in the Atlanta Convention, legislation which will provide for control over the Ladies Auxiliary Funeral Benefit Fund by a six-person board, consisting of three members of the Ladies Auxiliary, and three members of the Order, appointed by the respective Grand Worthy Presidents, with confirmation by the respective Boards of Trustees, with a seventh person to be selected from a list of five, those five names coming either from the National Arbitrators' Association or some other similar group that is mutually agreed upon, each group striking two from the list and the remaining person being allowed to decide the final outcome of any disagreed matters that are deadlocked;
- (3) The provisions of Section 26.5 of the Ladies Auxiliary Rules and Regulations shall be proposed by the Grand Board of Trustees as a Statute at the Grand Aerie Convention in Atlanta and supported by them with the following excepted language: The language excepted is: In the first line, "Effective September 1, 1991..." will be stricken and the language, "Effective immediately upon passage..." will be added.

In the third line, after the italicized word "...excluding...", "budgeted" will be deleted.

- (4) The Coalition members will dissolve the Coalition within forty days of the date of this Order, 5 June 1993, with proof of dissolution filed with the Grand Tribunal on or before forty days from said date, or be expelled;

- (5) Upon the passage of Items (2) and (3) above, the parties shall execute mutual releases excusing each other and all present and past Officers from any and all liability resulting from any activity in connection with the Coalition or removal of funds from the Ladies Auxiliary Funeral Benefit Fund.
- (6) Neither the Grand Aerie Officers, nor the Coalition members before us, shall speak ill of, degrade, or otherwise assassinate the character of the other, from the date of this Order;
- (7) The Grand Worthy President and the Grand Board of Trustees will meet prior to the International Convention in Atlanta, Georgia, to discuss with the Grand Auxiliary Board of Trustees and the Grand Madam President, in good faith, the budget percentages with the Budget Director in attendance;
- (8) Any meeting to discuss matters such as the budget or other items will take place only between the Board of Grand Trustees and the Grand Auxiliary Trustees, along with the Grand Worthy President and the Grand Madam President. The lines of communication shall remain open.

A copy of this Order will be distributed by the Grand Aerie under this signature of the Chief of the Grand Tribunal, and must be distributed to each Local Aerie President and Auxiliary President and each Local Aerie and Auxiliary Secretary, to be read by them at a regular meeting on the floor prior to the International Convention in Atlanta.

All previous Orders in this matter are hereby replaced by this Order, except that by our decision herein we do not inhibit the right of our members, be they Aerie or Auxiliary, to dissent and do so vigorously, but such dissent must be done within the Rituals, Statutes and Constitutions of our Order.

This year, there are several bills before the State Senate and the State Assembly that pertain to us.

Bill No. S.4004 read in the Senate is an amendment to the Games of Chance Law to include raffles

Bill No. S.3439 and A.5952 were introduced in Senate and Assembly to allow selling of bell jar tickets in vending machines.

Bill No. S.3667 in Senate and A.6539 in Assembly is an amendment to the Bell Jar Law to allow tickets to be sold with a total payout of two thousand five hundred dollars, the maximum now is one thousand dollars.

Bill No. S.4382 in Senate is an amendment to the Public Health Law that now states at bingo or casino games that if one person complains about smoking, all must stop smoking. The new bill states that the sponsor of these games must provide a non-smoking area but if fifty percent of the room is non-smoking, the other fifty percent of the room may smoke.

Bill No. A.6710 in the Assembly is an amendment to the bingo law which now states you can only work bingo for one organization. The amendment will let you work for more than one.

Bill No. A.6409 is an amendment to the bingo law that will add public schools and allow them to conduct bingo in the school buildings.

Bill No. S.4297 in Senate and A.6883 in Assembly is an amendment to the Public Health Law in regards to sale of tobacco products in vending machines. The amendment states that if you have a vending machine in your Aerie, it must be in plain site of the bar so that the sale of tobacco products can be supervised.

Bill No. A.5777 in the Assembly is an amendment to the Bell Jar Law which would allow the use of video gambling, electronic and mechanical slot machine.

As you know, the license plate bill became law and anyone wanting a plate may fill out an application now. The additional cost for the Eagle plate will be \$25.00 a year, a process fee the first year of \$6.25, and a plate cost of \$1.00 if you want F.O.E. and then a number. The cost will be an additional \$25.00 if you only want a number and there will be no extra charge.

As in the past, if any Aerie would like to take action on State legislation, please contact the State Legislative Committee or the State Executive Board first. Be sure it's approved before using the Fraternal Order of Eagles name.

FINAL REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

Grand Aerie Officers, Brother Delegates:

This is the final report of the Resolutions Committee. We have three (3) resolutions presented to the Committee as this time. They are as follows:

1st Resolution:

This Order of the Grand Tribunal was rendered in Columbus, Ohio, Saturday, June 5, 1993 and became effective immediately. Signed by William M. Hatten, Chief Justice.

In the matter of the expulsion of: Barbara Cyphers, Bonnie Quatkemeyer, Dolores Hoffman, Kathy Gonzagowski, Dolores Colclough, Marge Frey, Eugene Rott, Richard Stubbs, Dale Thomas:

GRAND TRIBUNAL ORDER

Pursuant to Article V of the Constitution of the Fraternal Order of Eagles and the inherent power vested in the Grand Tribunal, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED AS FOLLOWS:

(1) That the accused are hereby immediately ordered to cease and desist from supporting, participating in or condoning future coalition activities, or be expelled;

(2) The Board of Grand Trustees shall prepare for and support in the Atlanta Convention, legislation which will provide for control over the Ladies Auxiliary Funeral Benefit Fund by a six-person board, consisting of three members of the Ladies Auxiliary, and three members of the Order, appointed by the respective Grand Worthy Presidents, with confirmation by the respective Boards of Trustees, with a seventh person to be selected from a list of five, those five names coming either from the National Arbitrators' Association or some other similar group that is mutually agreed upon, each group striking two from the list and the remaining person being allowed to decide the final outcome of any disagreed matters that are deadlocked;

(3) The provisions of Section 26.5 of the Ladies Auxiliary Rules and Regulations shall be proposed by the Grand Board of Trustees as a Statute at the Grand Aerie Convention in Atlanta and supported by them with the following excepted language: The language excepted is: In the first line, "Effective September 1, 1991..." will be stricken and the language, "Effective immediately upon passage..." will be added.

In the third line, after the italicized word "...excluding...", "budgeted" will be deleted.

(4) The Coalition members will dissolve the Coalition within forty days of the date of this Order, 5 June 1993, with proof of dissolution filed with the Grand Tribunal on or before forty days from said date, or be expelled;

(5) Upon the passage of Items (2) and (3) above, the parties shall execute mutual releases excusing each other and all present and past Officers from any and all liability resulting from any activity in connection with the Coalition or removal of funds from the Ladies Auxiliary Funeral Benefit Fund.

(6) Neither the Grand Aerie Officers, nor the Coalition members before us, shall speak ill of, degrade, or otherwise assassinate the character of the other, from the date of this Order;

(7) The Grand Worthy President and the Grand Board of Trustees will meet prior to the International Convention in Atlanta, Georgia, to discuss with the Grand Auxiliary Board of Trustees and the Grand Madam President, in good faith, the budget percentages with the Budget Director in attendance;

(8) Any meeting to discuss matters such as the budget or other items will take place only between the Board of Grand Trustees and the Grand Auxiliary Trustees, along with the Grand Worthy President and the Grand Madam President. The lines of communication shall remain open.

A copy of this Order will be distributed by the Grand Aerie under this signature of the Chief of the Grand Tribunal, and must be distributed to each Local Aerie President and Auxiliary President and each Local Aerie and Auxiliary Secretary, to be read by them at a regular meeting on the floor prior to the International Convention in Atlanta.

All previous Orders in this matter are hereby replaced by this Order, except that by our decision herein we do not inhibit the right of our members, be they Aerie or Auxiliary, to dissent and do so vigorously, but such dissent must be done within the Rituals, Statutes and Constitutions of our Order.

2ND Resolution:

WHEREAS, Theodore Hurwitz served as State Aerie President of the State Aerie for the 1964-1965 fraternal year.

WHEREAS, Theodore Hurwitz has paid back all monies owed to his Aerie, Oneonta Aerie 1260.

WHEREAS, Theodore Hurwitz has been reinstated in his local Aerie Oneonta Aerie 1260.

NOW BE IT RESOLVED, Theodore Hurwitz is reinstated as a Past President of the State Aerie and entitled to all privileges of this title.

Brother Straub advised that the application has to be signed. A non-member cannot propose a membership. He felt we should let these people recognized for getting thee members. He stated that you spend the money first before you get the money from the Grand Aerie at which time you submit a voucher. We are not asking to increase the stipend.

Brother McDermott stated that the money you get back in return for what you have organized you have spent twice over, or three times as much. The Grand Aerie has not done anything. The Grand Aerie wants per capita tax and wants organizations and says all they want is for you to do the work, but don't want to give you anything. We should take and accept this.
